# **DEFINITIONS**

## ***Scholarship***

A monetary award based on academic merit or excellence in the area to which the award pertains. This may also include involvement in extra-curricular and community activities, and personal qualities such as leadership ability and citizenship.

## ***Entrance Scholarship***

An award that is available to students who are proceeding from grade 12 to studies at a post-secondary institution. These scholarships are awarded by the specific institution to new admissions.

## ***Bursary***

A non-repayable award made to students who are in need of financial assistance and who have maintained a satisfactory academic record. Evidence of need may be required.

## ***B.C. Student Assistance Program***

The B.C. Student Assistance Program provides both repayable loan and non-repayable grant and loan remission to help meet the costs of your post-secondary education. For further information, contact the Financial Awards Office of the post-secondary institution you plan to attend, or contact:

# SCHOLARSHIP STRATEGY

## A. INTRODUCTION:

Scholarships need not be as elusive as that pot of gold at the end of the rainbow. With a little effort one can develop a “*scholarship strategy*” which will enable you to sort through the myriad of available scholarships, bursaries, grants, and awards with relative ease. The keys to success are planning and education. Planning and preparation should begin early in the school year to provide maximum flexibility in the pursuit of your scholarship goals. You, of course, must also know what you are looking for and what you are capable of attaining; and this is where education comes in. You will have to become familiar with scholarship types, scholarship terminology, necessary qualifications, application procedures, references, etc.

## B. STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES:

1. Survey the range of scholarships available. Keep up to date by reading posted information, attending scholarship meetings, and making regular inquiries regarding the latest material available.
2. Determine which scholarships are *realistically* available by consulting the criteria and application deadlines pertinent to each scholarship.
3. Obtain application forms, collect the necessary documents (marks, transcripts, reference letters), prepare any required essays or resumes, and submit applications in time to meet deadlines.
4. Maintain a high Grade Point Average (G.P.A.) Note those scholarships for which candidates are screened according to G.P.A. achieved. (In some cases the relevant G.P.A. may be based on grades achieved in a specialty area over a two-year period.)
5. Since many scholarships require more than high academic standing, students should consider such areas as community service, volunteer work, extra-curricular involvement and participation.

## C. STRATEGY:

Scholarship candidates should adopt the following strategies for making scholarship applications:

1. Begin the application procedure sufficiently early in the school year. The process of acquiring an application form, completing the form, gathering letters of reference and recommendations, and returning all relevant documents can take a considerable length of time.
2. Chart the scholarships for which you intend to apply, making special note of the deadlines for each. This exercise will help you establish your own personal timeline.
3. Apply for as many scholarships as possible. Note those for which you can apply serially (where one application form suffices for several scholarships) and those for which you must apply individually.
4. Apply for a Canadian Social Insurance Number (S.I.N.) if you do not already have one. Recipients of Provincial District awards and of Provincial Scholarships must have a Canadian

S.I.N. Recipients of scholarships administered by the universities may also be required to have one.

5. ***Prepare a letter of application early in the school year.*** When you write the letter, it should include this information:

- An outline of your interests, hobbies, and activities.
- A summary of positions and offices you have held in school, youth organizations, and the community.
- A short statement of the goals you wish to achieve while attending a post-secondary institution.
- Information concerning awards, scholarships, and prizes which you have won in any field.
- Details of employment in the last two years, during vacations or after school.

Re-write the letter over the weeks and months, until you are pleased with the result. Make sure that your letter is neat and legible, is on 8 ½" x 11" paper (one side only), and uses regular business letter format. Include all important information, and note the details specified on the application forms. Keep the tone of the letter businesslike; be straightforward and concise.

**\*\* Note:** *The "Student Profile" sheet attached to this booklet should assist you in preparing your letter.*

#### **D. HOW TO OBTAIN TRANSCRIPTS**

Many scholarship applications require the student to include a transcript of their high school marks (usually grades 11 and 12). Submit a transcript request form to the office. Transcript request forms are available in the counseling and main offices.

#### **E. LETTERS OF REFERENCE**

Principal, teacher, and/or counsellor reference letters are very important in an application. To do their best for you, they need to be given advance notice and sufficient time (at **LEAST two weeks**). Don't ask on Wednesday for a letter needed Friday.

**\*\*Provide them with a copy of your student's profile.** If possible, include a copy of the award for which you are applying, and in particular, a copy of the criteria upon which the award is based. Also, remember to express your appreciation to those who provide you with reference letters.

## **F. ESSAYS**

Some scholarships may require the applicant to write an essay or autobiography. Stick to the length, format, and subject matter specified in the instructions. If goals are requested, include short and long-term goals. Your long-term goals may change over the next few years, but that is usually taken into consideration. A good idea is to confer with an English teacher about your draft and final work.

## **G. SCHOLARSHIP FILE**

Keep a scholarship 'FILE'. Include copies of your student profile, applications, reference letters, resumes, transcripts, essays. Often, you may be able to use the same material for different applications. Being organized and having a ready file of scholarship data will save you a lot of time.

### ***What Do Award Administrators Typically Look For In Students?***

Awards administrators typically look for excellence in three areas:

1. High scholastic achievement (i.e. GPA of 3.0 to 4.0)
2. Outstanding school involvement
3. Outstanding community leadership
4. Outstanding citizenship

Examples of school involvement include:

- ❖ Students' Council
- ❖ Assistant coaches or managers of school teams
- ❖ Peer tutors
- ❖ Referees, scorers, and timers
- ❖ Library aides
- ❖ Office helpers
- ❖ Student store helpers
- ❖ Cafeteria and lunch hour helpers
- ❖ Involvement with teacher pro-d days
- ❖ Class tutors and language translators
- ❖ Student ambassadors for Grade 7 tours
- ❖ Organizing multi-cultural activity

Examples of community involvement include:

- ❖ Organizing a youth summer camp
- ❖ Organizing a youth activity via a church group
- ❖ Volunteering at a senior citizens center
- ❖ Volunteering at a hospital or community center (eg. Surrey Community Center)
- ❖ Volunteering for a community group (eg. YMCA)

# SEVEN BASIC TYPES OF SCHOLARSHIPS

## 1. Provincial Scholarships: (\$1,000)

Provincial Scholarships are based on performance on provincial examinations. Scholarships of \$1,000 will be awarded to each student who earns a total Standard Ministry Score (SMS) of at least 1700 on his or her **highest three** provincial exams. The top twenty students in the province will receive awards of \$2,000 each.

*If you wish to be eligible for a provincial scholarship, you must:*

- Pass English 12
- Write provincial exams in at least three courses (You must receive at least 70% on an exam to receive an SMS). Qualifying courses include: English 12, Math 12, Biology 12, Chemistry 12, English Literature 12, French 12, Francais-Langue 12, Geography 12, History 12, Physics 12, Spanish 12, Geology 12.
- Achieve an SMS score of at least 475 on each of your three best exams.
- Achieve a total Standard Ministry Score of at least 1700 on your three best exams.
- Graduate from a British Columbia secondary school.
- Be a Canadian Citizen or permanent resident at the time the exam is written.
- Fulfill graduation requirements.

The three highest ranking scholarship students in the Province will also receive academic medals of excellence. The top qualifying candidate in each subject area will also have a special seal attached to their Scholarship Certificate.

## 2. District Scholarship Awards: \$1,000 (\$500 award, \$500 education grant)

The Ministry of Education also provides District Scholarship and Awards which are designed to acknowledge excellence in fields other than academic by assisting students to further their education in the business, vocational, technical, or fine arts fields.

Awards are given to those who have excelled in a **Career-Oriented** program such as Business Education, Fine and Performing Arts, Hospitality/Tourism, Industrial Education, or Home Economics. Students must have at least five courses in one career area with at least two of those courses being at the grade twelve level. Winners are determined by the Local District Scholarship Committee.

**Note:** *A student can not win **BOTH** a provincial and a District Scholarship.*

### 3. **Passport to Education:**

The passport to Education program recognizes and rewards student achievement in Grades 10 - 12.

The Ministry of Education allocates nine thousand Passport stamps for grades 10, 11 and 12. These are available to students throughout the province.

#### **Eligibility Criteria:**

- Must attend a public school, a group 1, 2 or 4 British Columbia Independent School or a Continuing Education centre
- Must be a Canadian Citizen or permanent resident.
- Awarded, primarily, for high marks and to a lesser extent on school determined factors.
- Redeemable at designated post-secondary institutions and approved Industry Training Authority (ITA) providers.

### 4. **University/College Entrance Scholarships:**

Most universities, colleges, and private post-secondary institutions, throughout North America provide **Entrance Scholarships** to superior Grade 12 students. The criteria for screening applicants is often in **March or April**. Students should carefully note deadlines and prepare their applications well in advance.

## 5. School-Based Scholarships and Bursaries

Scholarships and awards are available to qualified applicants who submit an application and meet specific eligibility requirements. Application for these awards can be made by completing the *Fleetwood Park Secondary Application for Bursaries and Scholarships* forms. Submit the application form, the financial information form, and your resume to Ms. Grant as soon as possible.

The criteria for selecting recipients may be based upon any one of the following:

- a) scholastic standing on provincial examination results
- b) grade 11 & 12 Grade Point Average and/or percent average
- c) specific criteria as determined by the contributor

## 6. Secondary School Apprenticeship Scholarship; \$ 1,000

Students who register as an apprentice in an Industry Training Authority endorsed trade prior to graduating from high school have an opportunity to participate in the Secondary School Apprenticeship program and qualify to receive a \$ 2,000 scholarship from the Ministry of Education.

### Eligibility Criteria:

- Must graduate from high School District #36 (Surrey) achieve a 67% average in their grade 12 courses
- Complete at least 480 hours of work as a Secondary School Apprentice
- Continue to work in the trade for five months after graduation or have 1,100 work-based training hours recorded with the Industry Training Authority.

*Note: Students must complete the 480 hours of work within three months of their graduation date.*

## **DIRECTIONS TO CANDIDATES FOR FLEETWOOD PARK SECONDARY BURSARIES AND SCHOLARSHIPS**

### **1) Eligibility**

- a) Candidates must be in Grade Twelve and must complete graduation requirements.
- b) Candidates must be intending to continue some form of vocational or academic training within one year of winning any award
- c) Candidates must have an above-average achievement record, ***particularly in those courses*** related to their future vocational plans. In the past, most awards have been made to students with an average of "B" or better.
- d) To receive the award, winning candidates must bring proof to the school that they have begun further training.
